Healthcare and Medication

All Kids: All Kids offers complete health insurance for your child. Doctors visits, hospital stays, prescription drugs, vision care, dental care, eyeglasses, regular check-ups and immunizations (shots) are all covered. All Kids also covers special services like medical equipment, speech therapy, and physical therapy for children in need.

FamilyCare: FamilyCare offers healthcare coverage to parents living with their children 18-years old, or younger, and covers relatives who are caring for children in place of their parents. Coverage is based on monthly income. Copays are less than \$5.
